I. "The prophet mourneth for the sins of the people of God"

[Full choir]

1 How doth the city sit solitary, that was full of people how is she become as a widow!

2 She that was great among the nations, and princess among the provinces: how is she become tributary!

[The two sides of the choir sing antiphonally, starting with the deaconi.]

3 She weepeth sore in the night, and her tears are on her cheeks: among all her lovers, she hath none to comfort her.

[2nd music setting]

- 4 The ways of Zion do mourn, because none come to the solemn assembly: all her gates are desolate, and she herself is in bitterness.
- 5 The Lord hath afflicted her for the multitude of her transgressions: her children are gone into captivity before the enemy. Lam. 1:1-5

[All voices in unison]

6 All they that go by clap their hands at her: they hiss, and wag their head at the daughter of Jerusalem saying,

[3rd music setting, new harmonies, still strong unison]

7 "Is this the city that men called the perfection of beauty; the joy of the whole earth?" Lam. 2:15

Refrain: Jerusalem, Jerusalem, return unto the Lord thy God.

II. "Christ recalleth us to God by his passion"

[Returning to the 1st music setting, the two sides of the choir return to singing antiphonally,]

8 For these things I weep:

mine eye runneth down with water. Lam. 1:16a

9 From on high hath the Lord sent fire into my bones, and it prevaileth against them:

he hath made me desolate and faint all the day. Lam. 1:13a

10 My flesh and my skin hath he made old:

he hath broken my bones. Lam. 3:4

11 He hath builded against me;

and compassed me with gall and travail. Lam. 3:5

12 He hath made me to dwell in dark places: as those that have been long dead. Lam. 3:6

[Men in unison, returning to the 2nd musical setting]

13 I am become a derision to all my people: and their song all the day. Lam. 3:14

14 Let him give his cheek to him that smiteth him: let him be filled full with reproach. Lam. 3:30

[Boys in unison]

15 Is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by:

behold and see if there be any sorrow like unto my sorrow. Lam. 1:12a

16 Remember mine affliction and my misery:

the wormwood and the gall. Lam. 3:19

Refrain: Jerusalem, Jerusalem, return unto the Lord thy God.

III. "The Church repenteth and turneth again"

[4^{th} music setting, the two sides of the choir sings antiphonally.]

17 Remember, O Lord, what is come upon us:

behold and see our reproach. Lam. 5:1

18 The joy of our heart is ceased:

our dance is turned into mourning. Lam. 5:15

19 The crown is fallen from our head:

woe unto us, for we have sinned. Lam. 5:16

20 For this our heart is faint:

for these things our eyes are dim. Lam. 5:17

21 Let us search and try our ways:

and turn again unto the Lord. Lam. 3:40

22 Turn thou us unto thee, O Lord, and we shall be turned:

renew our days as of old. Lam. 5:21

23 It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed:

because his compassions fail not. Lam. 3:22

- 24 They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness. Lam. 3:23
- 25 The Lord is my portion, saith my soul: therefore will I hope in him. Lam. 3:24
